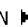

Best known for providing community-based care and treatment for people with mental illness, addictions or developmental disabilities, Lakeview Center also encompasses a vast network of child protective services throughout our four-county area, as well as vocational programs in five states and the District of Columbia.

In pursuit of their mission of helping people overcome life's challenges, Lakeview Center touches more than 30,000 lives annually, employs more than 2,000 individuals and has significant economic and social impact on the communities served. As a result, Lakeview Center compiles and submits its own annual report.

Baptist Health Care is a community-owned, not-for-profit health care organization committed to improving the quality of life for people and communities in northwest Florida and south Alabama. The Baptist Health Care system includes four hospitals, two medical parks, a nursing home, mental health facilities, outpatient centers and the Andrews Institute for Orthopaedics & Sports Medicine. With more than 5,500 employees, Baptist Health Care is the largest locally-owned employer in the Escambia-Santa Rosa area.

Our Employees

At Baptist Health Care, our team of dedicated professionals commits themselves not only to providing superior quality patient care, but also strives and aspires to improve the overall quality of life in our community by giving back, getting involved and taking action. Our employees open doors for opportunity, foster improvement in the human condition and provide hope for many in need. Our commitment goes far beyond that of traditional health care.

The employees of Baptist Health Care are the fabric of our organization, acting as role models and messengers of health and healing. They are dedicated and enthusiastic about making a difference in health care and in our community.

Baptist Health Care employees set the standard for community building, spirit and leadership. They serve on non-profit boards, champion charitable causes and provide an unprecedented number of hours to volunteer service. Many of our team members are involved in civic organizations, projects and events that foster goodwill and help improve quality of life in the communities we serve. They are highly dedicated to community engagement.

One of Baptist Health Care's six company Values is stewardship, meaning we take an active role in identifying community needs and encourage employees to get involved and make a difference. Our employees pride themselves in sharing their skills and talents to serve the community through charity and volunteerism.

Day-to-day, month-to-month, year-to-year, our employees build Habitat for Humanity houses, raise money and walk for the American Heart Association and the American Cancer Society, mentor children in area schools, participate in community holiday celebrations and provide Christmas for every child at a local school, C.A. Weis Elementary.

Diversity at Baptist Health Care

Baptist Health Care paints diversity with a broad brush. We recognize that different backgrounds and viewpoints are key to great leadership and success. In fact, Baptist Health Care has built the following standards into our award-winning culture:

Diversity eliminates barriers in operational and leadership positions. We make it our mission to treat all employees fairly regardless of race, age, religion, color, sex, disability, national origin, marital status and veteran status including compensation, training and promotion throughout our

organization. Our diversity is a reflection of the care, service and satisfaction that we extend to our communities. We aim to meet the health care needs of **all** we serve.

Baptist Health Care also has a Diversity Council, spearheading the following initiatives annually:

- Partnership with 100 Black Men of Pensacola to promote responsible fatherhood
- Mentor-Protege Program for minority businesses in partnership with Pensacola Area Chamber of Commerce
- Partnerships with area schools (A.A. Dixon Elementary School , C.A. Weis Elementary School and Pensacola High School). Programs geared toward in-house promotions and opportunities for advancement (Project Jump Start)
- Escarosa Regional School-To-Work Partnership, including job shadowing opportunities for students and educators
- Diversity training for employees implemented throughout the organization

Investing in Our Community, Our Commitment to Delivering Quality Health Care

A hallmark of Baptist Health Care's Mission is to improve the quality of life for patients and communities served regardless of their ability to pay. At Baptist Health Care, we provide quality medical care to all people who need immediate treatment. Patient welfare is our number No. 1 priority.

Community Snapshot

Baptist Health Care operates primarily in the Agency for Health Care Administration (AHCA) District 1. This district, comprised of Escambia, Santa Rosa, Okaloosa and Walton counties, has 12.4 percent of its population living below the federal poverty level. Fifteen percent of Escambia County residents fall into this category while Santa Rosa makes up 10.7 percent. With a population in the two counties of approximately 453,000, more than 61,000 residents could be eligible to qualify for charity care.

Charity Care

Charity medical care is defined as free care or discounted care given to persons deemed unable to pay based on established financial assistance policies.

When assessing a patient's ability to pay, Baptist Health Care uses the most recently published federal poverty guidelines, but it also includes certain cases where incurred charges are significant when compared to income.

In 2008, Baptist Health Care provided an **estimated total of \$21,809,470 in charity care**. *This figure represents Baptist, Gulf Breeze, Jay and Atmore Community Hospitals and Lakeview Center.

Charity care totals do not represent unpaid cost of Medicaid. An additional **net community benefit of \$8,758,854 was provided as unpaid Medicaid costs**.

Baptist Health Care provides a total combined community benefit of \$30,568,324.

*Baptist Health Care utilizes charity care reporting guidelines as set forth by VHA, a health care provider alliance of more than 2,400 not-for-profit health care organizations.

Separately, Baptist Home Health Care and Durable Medical Equipment provided **\$166,318** in 2008 in estimated charity services.

In addition to charity care, Baptist Health Care social workers assisted patients with medication, transportation needs and other discharge needs that equated to a value of **\$206,432** in 2008.

Baptist Health Care Foundation

Since 1975, Baptist Health Care Foundation has served to improve the lives and health care of thousands of individuals and families in northwest Florida and south Alabama.

While the initiatives supported by Baptist Health Care Foundation may change from year to year, their mission to develop philanthropic resources that improve health and human services for the communities served remains the same.

In 2008, the Foundation funded the following initiatives at Baptist Health Care:

- Indigent care and mammograms
- LifeFlight advanced crew education
- New surgical equipment for Atmore Community Hospital
- Financial support for new specialized van for Baptist Manor patients and clients
- Funding for sports physicals – granting free screenings for area high school athletes
- Financial support for new patient transport vehicle for Gulf Breeze Hospital patients
- Funding to complete renovations in the Baptist Towers Women's Imaging Center (mammography) and Surgi-Care

Baptist Health Care Foundation also supported the following community initiatives:

- The establishment of the Baptist Health Care Foundation endowed Nursing Scholarship at Pensacola Junior College
- The awarding of four community nursing scholarships through the Luther and Kathy Taylor Nursing Scholarship Program
- Gifts to area organizations including the American Cancer Society, American Heart Association, Red Cross of Northwest Florida, Big Brothers Big Sisters of Northwest Florida and Council on Aging

Contributions for 2008 by Baptist Health Care Foundation to affiliates, outside agencies/organizations and direct patient support services totaled \$1,313,071.

A Commitment to Service: Improving Community Health through Prevention and Education

Providing quality care and service excellence to communities served is not limited to a hospital or health care facility setting. At Baptist Health Care, we are committed to carrying out our Mission beyond facility doors through preventive health, education, support and awareness. We strive to improve the health of our community through free health screenings, support groups, educational seminars, and reaching out to special populations.

Community Engagement: Disease Prevention and Wellness Outreach

Baptist Health Care believes screenings saves lives. Screening events provide accessibility to preventive health care to uninsured and underinsured residents. Through such events, community residents receive the knowledge of resources available to them to lead active, health lifestyles.

In carrying out our Mission and Vision to improve the quality of life for communities served, Baptist Health Care provided more than 4000 community residents with free health care screenings in 2008. Screenings varied from heart and stroke risk assessments, body composition analysis, speech and hearing, breast cancer risk, osteoporosis heel scans, blood glucose testing for diabetes, sleep disorder testing, vision and sports physicals for youth, including echocardiograms.

Below is a sampling of the screening events offered by Baptist Health Care in 2008:

Breast Cancer Awareness, Mammography Program

Baptist Health Care and Cox Media partnered in October 2007 to provide free mammograms to uninsured or underinsured women. For ease and convenience to community women, mammograms were available at six Baptist Health Care locations, including Baptist Hospital, Gulf Breeze Hospital, Baptist Medical Park - Nine Mile, Baptist Medical Park - Navarre, Jay Hospital and Atmore Community Hospital. **As a result, 140 women received free mammograms.**

Colorectal Cancer Screening Kits

In another joint venture to raise awareness and increase access to preventive health care resources, Baptist Health Care worked with WEAR TV 3 and AmerisourceBergen (a drug wholesaler) to provide colon cancer screening kits to the community. Colon cancer screenings were available for pick up at two Baptist Health Care locations in Pensacola. As a result of the campaign, **more than 400 people** visited Baptist Health Care to pick up a colon cancer screening kit.

Family Expo

Baptist Health Care hosted the 16th annual Family Expo – a one-day family event complete with screenings and preventive health information – in September. Each year, the event is held in a centralized location, which can be easily accessed by all community members via public transportation bus routes.

In 2008, Family Expo welcomed more than 6,000 attendees and provided a total of 1,005 screenings. More specifically, 176 heart risk assessments, 96 stroke risk assessments, 261 blood glucose screenings, 200 body composition analysis, 225 osteoporosis heel scans, 47 speech screenings were provided for children ages 2 to 5 years old.

Also, as a result of Family Expo partners and vendors, 120 free bike helmets were provided and 367 pounds of food were donated to Manna Food Pantries.

Mole Patrol

Mole Patrol is a skin cancer screening event intended to raise awareness of good skin health as well as skin cancer prevention. The third annual, 2008 Mole Patrol performed more than **500 skin cancer screenings** during the one-day event. Mole Patrol is held in conjunction with the annual Blue Angels Air Show in Pensacola and was a collaborative effort of Baptist Health Care, Moffitt Cancer Center and AAA Auto Club South.

In addition to skin cancer screenings, Baptist LifeFlight also provided free first aid services and training to the community throughout the weekend event. LifeFlight serves 300 to 500 individuals with basic first-aid and evaluation as well as water and sunscreen, all free of charge to attendees. An estimated value of services including staff volunteer hours, medical and disposable supplies, equipment and LifeFlight operating costs total more than \$8400.

Prostate Cancer Screenings

During the month of September, Baptist Health Care recognizes national Prostate Cancer Awareness month with two free prostate cancer screening events. A prostate cancer screening includes a physical exam and a Prostate Specific Antigen (PSA) blood test. During the 2008 two-night screening event, **59 men were tested for prostate cancer. Fourteen of the men had abnormal findings.**

In addition to the screening events in September, a Baptist Health Care physician partner provided health education and free prostate cancer screenings in area churches. **An additional 30 participants were screened** for prostate cancer through this effort, entitled, "House Calls."

Senior Expo

Baptist Health Care's GoldenCare program set out in 2008 to bring preventive health care information, resources and screening opportunities to seniors throughout northwest Florida and southern Alabama. Senior Expo traveled to six Baptist Health Care facilities, providing free heart and stroke assessments, glucose and blood pressure screenings, osteoporosis and grip strengths scans. Through such efforts, **965 screenings were provided** to area seniors.

Sports Physicals

Baptist Health Care's Andrews Institute for Orthopaedics & Sport Medicine provides free sports physicals for all Escambia and Santa Rosa county high school athletes. The comprehensive, free screenings and sports physicals are required of all athletes each year in order to participate in school athletics. Through two separate events Baptist Health Care hosted more than 2100 high school students in 2008.*

**Sports physicals for high school athletes as described are not included in the total number of community residents screened in 2008*

Take a Loved One to the Doctor

Baptist Health Care partnered with a local radio station, Magic 106, to localize the national "Take a Loved One to the Doctor" event. The national event urged all Americans to focus on disease prevention and early detection, beginning with a visit to a health care professional for a check-up. The program specifically reached out to racial and ethnic minorities, who endure the greatest health care gap.

Baptist Health Care's Take a Loved One to the Doctor event was held at Greater Union Baptist Church, and **provided more than 36 free screenings.** Additional health screenings were offered at a discounted cost as well; **more than 50 people chose to participate.**

Wear Red Day

The American Heart Association estimates that 550,000 new cases of heart failure are reported annually. Heart disease is the No. 1 cause of death in both men and women, claiming a life every 34 seconds. Additional research by the American Heart Association shows that only 13 percent of women view heart disease as a health threat.

Locally, **Escambia County residents have an 11 percent higher rate of heart disease deaths** compared to peer counties in the state of Florida.

In 2008, Baptist Heart and Vascular Care teamed up with Cardiology Consultants, Belk and the American Heart Association to host the 2008 Wear Red Day – a local screening and health information event in support of the national day of recognition to educate women on risk factors as well as the signs and symptoms of cardiovascular disease.

Assessments at Wear Red Day included a family history review, non-fasting total cholesterol check and blood pressure check. **The first annual event provided 162 women and 20 men with free heart risk assessments** in an easily accessible public location.

Throughout Heart Month in February 2008, Baptist Health Care led **six additional events** to raise awareness of heart disease, improving the quality of life for the greater community. The combined total of additional event screenings and Wear Red Day **resulted in 288 free heart risk assessments**.

Community Engagement: Education and Training

Baptist Health Care also improves the community's health through education and prevention by meeting a broad range of community health education needs. Educational seminars in 2008 – **totaling more than 200** – included disease risk and awareness, medication training and support, fitness, mental health, pool and beach safety, and general health and wellness for the mind, body and spirit. Each educational seminar is designed to reach special populations, providing specific information related to key diseases as based on community needs.

Dinner with the Doc

Baptist Health Care strives to provide convenient, direct access to both physicians and services outside normal office settings or appointments. Baptist Health Care recognizes that educational seminars and more one-on-one presentations lead to increased patient empowerment and health ownership.

Baptist Health Care hosted eight Dinner with the Doc educational seminars in 2008, **welcoming 422 people**. Dinner with the Doc provides participants with a free dinner and educational tips on a variety of subjects, including gynecology, neurology and orthopaedics.

GoldenCare

Baptist Health Care's GoldenCare, a free wellness program for residents age 50 and older, reaches out to seniors in the community and improves access to health care by providing monthly health education and screenings. GoldenCare administers seminars in a wide geographic area that includes Pensacola, central Escambia County, Gulf Breeze, Navarre and Jay in Florida, and Atmore, Ala.

In 2008, GoldenCare continued its efforts to grow seniors' ability to make beneficial health care choices through monthly seminars (66 total), quarterly newsletters, free health screening events and healthy e-mail tips. Topics include: healthy aging and holidays, diabetes, advance directives, new

imaging options and sleep disorders and well as heart, colorectal, stroke, skin cancer, foot care and gynecological health education.

Monthly GoldenCare seminars averaged 130 attendees; ensuring seniors were armed with the knowledge and resources to make successful, healthy decisions. More than 22,000 community seniors are members of GoldenCare.

Get Healthy Pensacola!

Baptist Health Care's health and wellness incentive program, Get Healthy Pensacola!, rewards members of the community for making healthy decisions, promoting active, healthier lifestyles. Get Healthy Pensacola! members are rewarded points for activities such as regular physician check ups, exercising, participating in health education seminars as well as other healthy lifestyle choices. Members can redeem points for prizes including massages, gym memberships and tickets to local events.

In addition, Get Healthy Pensacola! provides members with the tools to succeed in healthy living, including monthly seminars, bi-monthly newsletters, free health screening events and healthy e-mail tips.

In 2008, 1,294 people participated in 21 wellness seminars covering topics such as dealing with mental health issues, proper exercise techniques, disease prevention and nutrition. Get Healthy Pensacola! has more than 10,000 active members.

Professional Education

In addition to providing health education to community members, Baptist Health Care leads training efforts to health and safety related professionals including fire departments, first responders and health profession students. Funded by Baptist Health Care, these trainings focuses on ensuring patients receive quality care from the exact time of need through survivorship.

- Mental Health Monday

Lakeview Center's Mental Health Monday seminars provide education and CEUs on various mental health topics for nurses, mental health professionals, school personnel and individuals involved in the care of mentally ill and disabled populations. Mental Health Mondays ensures fellow health care professionals are educated and aware of specific mental health topics/issues and are familiar with the resources available to them as well as their clients. Mental Health Mondays provides breakfast monthly to nearly 60 attendees, resulting in an approximate \$305 cost to the program. This on-going educational service is free to its attendees.

- Baptist LifeFlight

As a service to the community and patients, LifeFlight assumes the responsibility of sharing knowledge regarding emergency care with members of the health care team. LifeFlight is actively involved in research that directly relates to improved processes and care in the medical transport industry. In fact, within the year, LifeFlight leads approximately 95 training events, seminars and classes.

- Baptist MotherBaby Care Center

According to the Escambia County Health Department's Healthy Start program – an initiative fostering healthy parenting from pregnancy through adulthood and reducing the number of infant deaths and low-birth weight babies – more than 15 percent of Escambia County babies are born pre-maturely. An additional 10 percent of babies born in Escambia County are considered low-birth weights. The Baptist Mother Baby Care Center participates in several

events throughout the year - in high schools and other public forums - to help educate women on health pregnancy choices, post-delivery health care needs, breastfeeding, shaken baby syndrome and family-related concerns.

Baptist Health Care is proud to be a continued partner with Pensacola Junior College, the University of West Florida, Virginia College, Escambia and Santa Rosa school districts and Escambia County, Alabama School District. Mentoring, volunteering, work shadow and on-site trainings are educational collaborations that Baptist Health Care is committed to in furthering the education, knowledge and expertise of tomorrow's health care professionals.

Honor Flight

In Spring 2008, Baptist Health Care sponsored Emerald Coast Honor Flight - a not-for-profit organization created to honor America's veterans for their service – sending 102 World War II Northwest Florida veterans from northwest Florida to Washington, D.C. Senior and terminally ill veterans were given priority to take part in the inaugural trip. Baptist Health Care provided a financial contribution of \$25,000, medical leadership and oversight as well as wheel chairs.

Supporting and Nurturing Community Needs

Baptist Health Care supports our patients and communities through the continuum of care. Whether it is preventive, survivorship or treatment-related, Baptist Health Care offers 12 support groups to help our patients meet life's health care challenges head on. Extending Services and Commitment: Our Partners in Caring for the Community

Baptist Health Care recognizes the collaborative value in partnering with other not-for-profit organizations to meet the broader health care needs of the community. Such partnerships achieve greater reach of education and increase frequency and access to needed health care services.

Baptist Health Care is proud to support the following two community-wide organizations: Escambia and Santa Rosa counties community clinics and the WE CARE program.

Escambia and Santa Rosa County Clinics

Escambia Community Clinics is a community health center providing quality, comprehensive primary and preventive health care services to residents of Escambia County and the surrounding areas.

In 1992, Baptist Health Care, in partnership with another local hospital, established the free standing Escambia Community Clinic (ECC) to provide outpatient primary health care services to the county's poor, underserved and medically needy residents. Operating as a separate corporation, ECC has provided more than 510,000 outpatient visits and has admitted more than 1,200 patients for hospitalization at Baptist Hospital since its inception.

In 2008, Baptist Health Care continued its annual contribution of **\$525,000**. As a result of Baptist Health Care's support, ECC was able to provide **190 inpatient hospitalization days and funded more than 1,200 charity patients with prescription drugs** through pharmaceutical company compassionate drug programs. This represents more than 6,100 prescriptions with a retail value of more than \$561,000.

Forty-nine percent of all patient visits were non-paying, either a charity-approved patient or a visit by a person considered to be medically needy or the working poor.

ECC maintains a group of more that 22,000 active patients who call ECC their medical home.

In late 2007, ECC received Federally Qualified Health Center Status from Health Resources and Services Administration, Bureau of Primary Health Care. With FQHC status ECC was awarded grant funding of \$600,000 annually for three years. As a designated FQHC, the operations of ECC are directed through a board of directors consisting of eleven members of whom the majority are users of clinic services.

Baptist Hospital continues to maintain a presence on the board, holding one seat.

This contribution is part of a Community Benefits Grant and is intended to assist with providing primary care services to the underinsured and uninsured citizens of Escambia County. Through funding support from Baptist Health Care and federal grant dollars, ECC has added chronic disease case management, women's health care and social services. The annual contributions also support one additional primary care physician, one mid-level provider and diabetic medications and supplies for charity patients.

Under the administration of ECC, the Santa Rosa Community Clinic delivered **3,050 outpatient visits and directly or indirectly generated charity care estimated at more than \$1.8 million.**

Through leadership and fiscal allocations, Baptist Health Care has significantly improved the health and well-being of the working poor, indigent and medically needy citizens of Escambia and Santa Rosa counties.

WeCare

The We Care Program of Escambia County cares for and meets the specialty medical needs of the community's uninsured residents.

WE Care is a cooperative effort of Baptist Hospital, two other local hospitals, Escambia Community Clinics, the Escambia Public Health Department, the Escambia County Board of County Commissioners and the Escambia County Medical Society.

We Care works to close the critical gap in health care access to those who otherwise would not receive care or would seek care in emergency rooms. We Care is geared toward improving health care access in Escambia and Santa Rosa counties.

Through WE CARE, Baptist Health Care and its physicians provide health education as well as private primary and specialty medical care for indigent Escambia and Santa Rosa county residents. Baptist Health Care social workers work diligently each year to gain Medicaid eligibility for prospective WE CARE patients.
